



The daughter of writer/choreographer Carla Blank and novelist Ishmael Reed, Tennessee was diagnosed at an early age with several language-based learning disorders. The bottom line, the experts agreed, was that she would never read or write. Within a few years, however, she published her first book of poetry.

Spell Albuquerque is an inspiring memoir of one woman's struggle to overcome racism and institutional authority and to achieve what everyone said was impossible.

Tennessee Reed is the author of five books of poetry, including *City Beautiful, Airborne*, and *Electric Chocolate*. She is a graduate of UC Berkeley, and has a master's degree from Mills College.

Stuart Christie is the co-founder of Anarchist Black Cross and Cienfuegos Press, and the author of *Granny Made Me an Anarchist*. He was imprisoned in 1964 for attempting to assassinate Spanish dictator Francisco Franco.

On a damp night in February 2003, as the U.S. prepared to invade Iraq, five Catholic Worker activists scrambled across runways and broke into a hangar at Shannon Airport. Swinging hammers and a pickaxe, they did more than \$2.5 million of damage to a U.S. Navy transport plane.

The five were hit with the full weight of the law, and were quickly condemned by the media and much of the anti-war movement. But three-and-a-half years later a Dublin jury decided they were innocent of any crime. This is the story of how a civilian airport in the west of Ireland became a "Pitstop of Death," and how an act of conscience touched the hearts and minds of twelve jurors, making political and legal history, in an epic of popular resistance.


DIRECT ACTION: AN ETHNOGRAPHY

Written in a clear, accessible style (with a minimum of academic jargon), this study brings readers behind the scenes of a movement that has changed the terms of debate about world power relations. From informal conversations in coffee shops to large "spokescouncil" planning meetings and tear gas-drenched street actions, Graeber paints a vivid and fascinating picture.

David Graeber is an anthropologist and activist who teaches at the University of London. Active in numerous direct-action political organizations, he has written for *Harper's Magazine* and is the author of *Fragments of an Anarchist Anthropology*, *Towards an Anthropological Theory of Value*, and *Possibilities*.




YOU DON'T PLAY WITH REVOLUTION: THE MONTRÉAL LECTURES OF C.L.R. JAMES

Ranging in topic from Marx and Lenin to Shakespeare and Rousseau to Caribbean history and the Haitian Revolution, these lectures demonstrate the staggering breadth and clarity of James' knowledge and interest. Little information exists in print on the critical period James spent working with West Indian intellectuals and students in Canada in the late 1960s; this collection highlights the themes we have come to associate with James' critical project and situates them in a new light. Readers just beginning to delve into James' work will find this collection accessible and engaging, an ideal introduction to a complex and multi-faceted body of scholarship. Editor David Austin has also included two seminal interviews produced with James during his stay in Canada, and a series of letters James exchanged with the West Indian university students who made these lectures possible.



Labor disputes have produced more violence over a longer period of time in the United States than in any other industrialized country in the world. From the 1890s to the 1930s, hardly a year passed without a serious—and often deadly—clash between workers and management. Written in the 1930s, and now reprinted with a new introduction, *Dynamite* recounts a fascinating and largely forgotten history of class and labor struggle in America's industrial beginnings.

It is the story of brutal exploitation, massacres, and judicial murders of the workers. It is also the story of their response: when peaceful strikes yielded no results, workers fought back by any means necessary.

Louis Adamic has written the classic story of labor conflict in America, detailing many episodes of labor violence, including the Molly Maguires, the Homestead Strike, Pullman Strike, Colorado Labor Wars, the Los Angeles Times bombing, as well as the case of Sacco and Vanzetti.

A Living Revolution explores the foundations of the kibbutz movement, providing a detailed look at its initial economic, social, and political organization. Basing his research largely on newly translated letters, diaries, and essays by key figures and participants, Horrox uncovers a deep and explicitly anarchist strain running through the movement's early days. Not only does this illuminate a neglected aspect of Jewish history, it takes serious issue with Marxist and other historians, especially those who see the kibbutzim primarily as progenitors of the Israeli state. At the same time, it depicts anarchism as both an inspiring utopian ideology and a viable social practice.

In June 1985, Diana Block, her two-week-old son, and five companion revolutionaries fled Los Angeles after finding a surveillance device in their car. She spent the next decade living underground on the run from the FBI, raising two children and juggling security, solidarity, and motherhood.

In a perfect demonstration that the personal is political, Diana's memoir offers unique insights into efforts to build homegrown clandestine resistance to U.S. imperialism. Relayed with emotional depth and a poetic style, Arm the Spirit brings a woman's perspective to a subject typically dominated by heroic, male discourse. The book also traces Diana's political development on either side of her period underground, offering a history of the culture and politics of the 1960s and 1970s—especially the decisions that led many to take up arms against the U.S. government—as well as an analysis of the political terrain of the 1990s, when Diana resurfaced and tried to reintegrate into a very different world.

Between 1998 and 2003, and again in the spring of 2008, Shon made numerous trips to the region and was fascinated with the history, politics, and people of the countries he visited. The result is an intellectual—but not academic—study seen through the eyes of an American anarchist. Tales of run-ins with skinheads, cops, border patrols, anarchists, and everyday people illustrate the power politics of this polyethnic region. Identifying strongly with anti-nationalists along the way. Shon comes to the conclusion that the nation-state itself is the main culprit feeding ethnic strife.


Not only are we financially constrained as to what we can publish, we already have a huge backlog of excellent material we would like to publish sooner, rather than later.
